### Life with the Zo'é \*

**No religion, no leaders, no laws, no money. Chaos, anarchy .... or perhaps Utopia? The Zo'é have been living this way happily and peacefully for thousands of years. Should we pity or envy them?**

Extract from the diary of an anthropologist who lived with the Zo'é for some time.

March 25<sup>th</sup>

As our tiny aeroplane landed deep in the Amazon rainforest, we were at once surrounded by groups of smiling, whispering Indians – the Zo'é, among whom we will live for the next two months. Sydney, my guide, explained that the Zo'é have had almost no contact with the outside world. How primitive they seem, running around practically naked! This is what everyone must have looked like thousands of years ago.

April 3<sup>rd</sup>

The Zo'é are a peaceful people. Members of the tribe who act aggressively immediately feel so ashamed that they run away into the forest until their anger has passed. Today, Tamiri suddenly became angry. It could have turned into an unpleasant incident, but what actually happened was that the other villagers simply pushed him to the ground and started tickling him. The end result was a pile of happy, laughing people. Incredible! Violence does not exist here. I am beginning to wonder whose society is more primitive.

April 28<sup>th</sup>

I have often wondered how the Zo'é live in such amazing harmony! Sydney claims that the answer to that question lies in their unique family structure. There is no limit to the number of husbands or wives a Zo'é can have, yet no one becomes jealous. Brothers may even share the same wife. However, if a man wants to marry another man's wife, he must get permission first. It's all quite confusing. Yet could it be that this relaxed family structure is the reason why Zo'é society has managed to survive for so long without laws or leaders?

May 6<sup>th</sup>

The Zo'é live happily with neither gods nor religion. Things might have stayed the same way forever, but a few years ago the government decided that it had to save these poor people. They sent government agents to the village to see what could be done. Although they meant well, these people did more harm than good by introducing alien concepts like religion and authority – as well as the flu, a previously unknown illness that killed 40 of the villagers.

Was it right to interfere? In my opinion, the government should have allowed these gentle people to live their lives as they have always done, without the help of "civilised" society.
